

Dear friends in Christ,

How often do we say what people want to hear, just to smooth things over? Even if we don't mean it, we may find ourselves smiling and nodding when asked to do something. But then we have to decide what to do next. Do we follow through on a half-hearted commitment, resenting the time it takes, or do we make an excuse why we can't possibly do what we said we would do?

Someone shared a list of lies that Rachel Zupak compiled for her blog, The Work Buzz. While they make me smile, I think that they are revealing about how we think and speak.

1. I'd be happy to.	That's the last thing I want to do!
2. My alarm didn't go off.	I was out late and I didn't hear my alarm.
3. I'm late because of traffic.	I'm late because I didn't plan enough time to travel.
4. I understand completely.	I have no idea what you're talking about,
	but I don't want to look stupid.
5. Everything is under control.	No it isn't!
6. I'm sick.	I'm sick of work and need a day off.
7. This will only take a minute.	This will be really time-consuming.

It is obvious that what we say is not always the same as what we mean. Life is too short to waste with mixed messages and lies. We will be happier, and those we are with will be happier if we simply say what we mean, and mean what we say. The Bible guides us to speak the simple truth.

"Above all, my beloved, do not swear, either by heaven or by earth or by any other oath, but let your "Yes" be yes and your "No" be no, so that you may not fall under condemnation." James 5:12

"But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ." *Ephesians 4:15*

As we tell the truth, we want to speak the truth in love, so that we don't hurt or reject the person who asks us. But it is perfectly acceptable to say no, if the request doesn't match your priorities. Your priorities don't have to be the same as someone else's priorities. Yet you need to know what they are if you intend to hold them above other choices.

Our first priority as Christians is to follow the great commandment, to love the Lord our God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength, and love our neighbor as ourselves. If God calls you to go, you should find a way to go. We live out our faith in Jesus by sharing in the community of the church, as partners in worship, learning and service.

Marriage and family are also high commitments. When they fail, it is often because people have consistently put other things ahead of them. Good marriages and happy families don't just happen – they take a real effort to sustain and grow. They are worth time and attention.

Your work is how you provide for your family, and the way that you serve your neighbor day by day. God wants us to do our work well and faithfully, to the best of our ability. Yet work should not be all that we live for, a priority above all other things.

We also take part in community groups and activities, to make this a good, cooperative, and interesting place to live. These can be valuable as ways to draw people together and accomplish common goals. But sometimes their demands can become more than we can deal with.

And all the other things we like to do, our own entertainment and interests have to fit into the mix. They are important, shaping part of who we are. But they are not more important than God's call for our lives.

God gives us everything: our life, our relationships, our possessions, and our Savior, Jesus. What are we prepared to offer to the Lord as a sign of our gratitude? God asks simply for our life and our obedience. If God's saving gifts are of value to us, then we can show our thanks by making God's priorities our own.

We can play games and tell lies to one another, but not to God. The Lord knows very well what our priorities are by what we choose. What priorities do you show forth in your life?



Prayer List – New Pattern

Starting in March, we will begin a new pattern with our prayer list. Currently, it has many names, and we are not always sure who they are or how long they have been listed. That makes it harder to pray for people as something more than just a name.

You are always welcome to add someone to our prayer list if they need special prayer. Just call Kelly in the office, or give a note. We always ask that you make sure to get their permission before adding their name. Some people would rather be private about their needs.



Please give us your relationship to the person as well. We will list names on the list like this – Mari Eklund, Pastor John's Mother-in-law. It could also be a friend, neighbor, coworker, or other relative. This gives a context for who it is.

We will include those names on the list for four weeks after they are given. After that they will rotate off. If the person prayed for needs more time for prayer, just let the office know and we will include them for another cycle. If someone has long term needs, you may choose to include them when new challenges arise, or just keep renewing their name.

We certainly care for each person we are given to pray for. Our hope is that this will make our praying more focused and meaningful. Please let us know what you think of this new pattern in the months ahead.

February 4, 2025 Salem Congregational Council Meeting Highlights

The Congregation Council met at Salem on Tuesday, February 4, 2025, starting at about 6:30 p.m. Council members Ron Cunz, Alan Deaton, Walter Farley, Donna Fraley,

Bonnie Guyer, Connie Hanson, Durk Hellinga, Sharon Wallis and Pastor John Rothfusz were present. Jacqueline Beverage was absent.

Walter Farley led the devotions. The council voted to accept the minutes of the January 7 Congregation Council meeting, as prepared by Jackie Beverage.

The Minutes of Annual Congregational Meeting were also approved, with a correction to include the second vote on the constitutional amendments.

The Financial reports for December were examined. Dean Lundeen, the new treasurer, reported the following balances as of the meeting.

General Fund: \$15,070.72 Designated Fund: \$29,842.61 Capital Fund: \$39,759.36

Council members heard monthly reports from Pastor John Rothfusz and from council members representing Salem's committees. They reviewed the calendar to highlight events coming up in March and look for conflicts.

We heard a report of the ongoing needs of the Food Pantry, and brainstormed how we might support that ministry. Both food and monetary gifts are welcome and helpful.

The Synod Congregational Resourcing event is coming up on March 22, and any members are welcome to take part in that. This is a great chance to get new ideas and excitement for ministry.

Lenten Soup suppers are scheduled with committees taking the lead. The council voted to designate upcoming offerings. The Lenten Soup Supper offerings will go to the Food Pantry, The Lenten envelopes and loose offerings will go to our Synod Benevolence commitment, and the Easter Sunday offering will go to support the general budget.

The meeting closed with council comments, appreciating our congregation and the mix of leaders on the council this year.

Annual Congregational Meeting Report

The Salem Lutheran Annual Meeting was held Sunday, January 26th at 10 a.m. After devotions and calling a quorum, we saw a video from the Northern Illinois Synod, including a picture of Salem Lutheran at the installation of Pastor John Rothfusz. We approved the resolutions of thanks and appreciation for so many people who serve faithfully at Salem. The audit report was received, and the Annual Bulletin of Reports was received and accepted.

The proposed budget for 2025 was discussed and adopted, including a minor amendment to correct a few issues noticed in the Budget Review meeting.

The following members of the nominating committee were elected: Nancy Rex, George Webster, and Michele Farley. The voting members for the Synod Assembly were elected as well: Sharon Wallis, Durk Hellinga, and Marilyn Wouda. And Dean Lundeen was elected to the Endowment and Memorial Funds board.

There were two votes for the constitution updates. The first vote was a second required vote to approve the three constitutional amendments first passed in October. These related to terms on the Endowment and Memorial Funds board, allowing a Call Committee to decide by consensus, and changing the quorum to 10 percent of voting members. These passed without objection, meeting the 2/3 majority requirement.

The second vote was for the "housekeeping" amendments, which bring our constitution in line with the ELCA constitution after changes from the 2019 and 2022 churchwide assemblies. These changes were adopted without objection, excluding C10.08. which would have allowed for electronic participation at congregational meetings. A majority vote was required, and these passed.

The meeting was adjourned for a delicious potluck lunch.
